1 Introduction

This technical guideline relates to the assessment and management of Aboriginal heritage and Native Title which may be encountered during a project's planning, construction, operations or maintenance activities.

It forms part of the TG 0875 Environment and Heritage Technical Guidelines and is designed to provide insight into regulatory obligations associated with Aboriginal heritage and native title, as well as suggested approaches to manage risk.

Note the guideline is not exhaustive, and additional requirements may be necessary based on project- or site-specific activities, geographical location, or approval conditions.

2.2 Planning and design

MITIGATION MEASURES	STAKEHOLDERS
A Preliminary Assessment (desktop) must be undertaken to identify any potential Aboriginal heritage and native title constraints and risks, including registered Aboriginal heritage sites, native title areas, native title claims and Indigenous Land Use Agreements (ILUAs). The presence of environmental and landscape features which increase the likelihood of Aboriginal heritage should also be considered: • Watercourses, waterbodies, wells and springs • Claypans, rock holes • Sand dunes and hills • Coastal areas • Rocky outcrops	Environmental Officer Asset Planner
Potential Aboriginal heritage and native title impact avoidance options must be identified to influence options selection and decision making.	Environmental Officer Heritage Officer Asset Planner Design Manager
 Where there is a risk to impacting Aboriginal heritage that requires further investigation: Complete a desktop assessment report by a suitable qualified heritage consultant And if required: Conduct an on-ground Aboriginal heritage survey by a suitably qualified heritage consultant, in consultation with the appropriate Recognised Aboriginal Representative Body (RARB) and/or Traditional Owner(s) 	Environmental Officer Heritage Officer Asset Planner Consultant
Where the detailed assessment recommends development of a Cultural Heritage Management Plan, it should include identifying the potential to impact known and unknown Aboriginal heritage, control measures to avoid impacts, processes for management of Aboriginal heritage and discovery protocols. Where land that is subject to native title or an ILUA, notification and negotiation must be undertaken in accordance with the NT Act through the Crown Solicitor's Office. Dependent on the outcome of negotiation and notification, there may be request for further: Aboriginal heritage surveys Project planning amendments Compensation	Environmental Officer Heritage Officer Project Manager Consultant
Ensure all project documentation including design reports, data records and management plans, report on actions taken to avoid impacting Aboriginal heritage and native title or ILUAs.	Environmental Officer Project Manager
The level of Aboriginal group engagement on potential Aboriginal heritage presence and impacts should be determined on a project-by-project basis and defined as early as possible after project initiation.	Project Manager Stakeholder Engagement
 Where all alternatives to avoid impacts to Aboriginal heritage have been exhausted, a relevant authorisation must be obtained or agreed under the AH Act. This may include: A local heritage agreement with a RARB that has been approved under the AH Act Another type of agreement with an Aboriginal group under different legislation that is approved under the AH Act (e.g. an ILUA) Authorisation from the Minister for Aboriginal Affairs in accordance with Section 23 of the AH Act. Ensure that a project-specific discovery protocol is developed, including stop-work procedures, which will be maintained onsite during construction in the case of an unexpected find.	Project Manager Contractor

2.3 Construction

MITIGATION MEASURES	STAKEHOLDERS
All staff must be appropriately inducted and trained on their obligations regarding Aboriginal heritage, including the use of the discovery procedure.	Contractor
Ensure that any approved management plan(s) including Cultural Heritage Management Plans (if required) are adhered to and maintained onsite at all times during contrsruction.	Contractor
Any known Aboriginal heritage is to be clearly deliniated and communicated, as described within approved management plans.	Contractor
Where works occur in high risk areas or are in close proximity to known Aboriginal heritage, additional care must be taken for works involving excavation, in case of unknown Aboriginal heritage.	Contractor
Where required by a management plan, the presence of Aboriginal heritage monitors must be onsite during the nominated high-risk activities.	Contractor

MITIGATION MEASURES	STAKEHOLDERS
Disturbance to land must be minimised as much as practicable, with all vehicles to remain on designated tracks, and all storages, stockpiles and laydown areas to be clearly defined and delinated.	Contractor
Undertake ongoing consultation with the relevant RARB(s) or Traditional Owner(s) during construction, as required.	Stakeholder Engagement Heritage Officer Environmental Officer Project Manager
In the event of an unexpected Aboriginal heritage discovery, works are to STOP immediately in the area, and measures outlined in the discovery protocol must be followed.	Contractor
Events of unexpected discovery of Aboriginal heritage are considered an incident and must be reported immediately to SA Water in accordance with agreed incident reporting protocols as described in management plans.	Contractor
