#### 1 Introduction

This guideline relates to the assessment and management of weeds which may be encountered during a project's planning, construction, operations or maintenance activities.

It forms part of the TG 0875 Environment and Heritage Technical Guidelines and is designed to provide insight into regulatory obligations associated with weeds, as well as suggested approaches to manage risk.

Note the guideline is not exhaustive, and additional requirements may be necessary based on project- or site-specific activities, geographical location, or known populations of declared weed species.

# 2 Weed hygiene

## 2.1 Overview

Statutory obligations	<ul> <li>Landscape South Australia Act 2019 (SA), Section 8: A person must act reasonably in relation to the management of natural resources within the State.</li> <li>Biodiversity Act 2025 (SA) Section 11: An entity must not undertake an activity that harms or has the potential to harm biodiversity unless the entity takes all reasonable and practicable measures to prevent or minimise any resulting harm.</li> </ul>

## 2.2 Planning and design

MITIGATION MEASURES	STAKEHOLDERS
A Preliminary Assessment must be undertaken to identify any weed risks and constraints such as Weeds of National Significance, declared or undeclared weeds.	Environmental Officer Project Manager
Where there is a risk of weed impacts in remnant native vegetation, a Detailed Vegetation Assessment must include declared and undeclared weed infestations (including weed mapping) and recommendations to minimise weed impacts.	Environmental Officer Project Manager

## 2.3 Construction

MITIGATION MEASURES	STAKEHOLDERS
All weed management measures must be in general accordance with the declared and undeclared plant policies issued by PIRSA.	Contractor
Recommendations from any preliminary or detailed assessment regarding weed management must be included in approved management plans with control measures implemented to avoid spreading invasive species.	Contractor
Appropriate weed control must be completed prior to plant and equipment mobilising to site or undertaking any ground disturbance activities.	Contractor
Wash down and inspection stations must be established to clean and inspect vehicles and machinery of any dirt or mud that may harbor weeds or seeds as required.	Contractor
Ensure any imported fill has a low risk of containing weeds. As a risk-based approach, material is considered weed and pest free if:	Contractor
<ul> <li>Quarry material is sourced at depth and is not stockpiled or surface material.</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Sourced from a licenced quarry (or quarry site inspected by the local Landscapes Board confirming appropriate weed management arrangements).</li> </ul>	
<ul> <li>Records (i.e. email, memo, letter etc.) from the quarry indicating it meets quality control. Any confirmation (i.e., certificate) that material is weed free from supplier should be retained.</li> </ul>	
Ensure management plans include appropriate detail on the type and location of all weed hygiene control measures to be implemented to manage weed risk	Contractor
